Week of Prayer

During our Week of Prayer each evening was led by a different person sharing differing perspectives on what fruitfulness looks like for Leyland Baptist Church and for us as individuals.

These are the themes which came out.

The need for a committed connection to Christ

If you grow an apple tree from a pip you could get any sort of apple, and of any taste or quality. To ensure you get apples of a certain variety, taste and edibility you need to graft your apple tree onto good root stock. The Bible verse talks about remaining in the vine. In Jesus' time people were familiar with the vines and how to grow them successfully. We are a bit more familiar with apples. To ensure our fruitfulness bears good fruit that is from God we need to be grafted onto the good root stock that is Christ.

Be dependent on the Holy Spirit.

To be fruitful we have to be dependent on the Holy Spirit; we achieve nothing in our own strength, only in God's strength through the Holy Spirit.

Abide in God.

A fruitful church abides in God through prayer, meeting together, studying the Bible, doing and being, serving each other and the world, eating together, teaching, hospitality and fellowship.

Uganda Mission Trip, Encourage Ministries, 2025

Amazing. Wonderful. Challenging. Exhausting. Beautiful. Joyful. Heartbreaking.

Those are all words Carole and Liz use to describe their time in Uganda.

Uganda is a place of contradictions, where the modern and the ancient exist side by side. On the same roads as modern tankers and lorries you will find cows and goats being herded along. Modern designer shops without price tags are close to women sitting on the street with piles of bananas, tomatoes and onions in front of them. Houses with electricity and running water, and huts made of mud bricks with cooking done outside, 2 rooms and inhabitants in double figures. Professionals in suits with smartphones, and children with no shoes and holes in their clothes.

Yet those we met were more joyful and full of life than we ever seem to be. They were glad to be alive, despite life being hard and having so little.

Carole and Liz went for almost 3 weeks with Encourage Ministries. During that time they preached and prayed in schools, prisons, churches in slum areas, a refugee settlement and education projects. In each place the hope of Christ, his love and forgiveness for all people, and his desire to be alongside them throughout life and beyond. Gifts of some of the essentials of life were also distributed; sugar, soap, flour, books, clothes, pencils and Bibles.
